A Day in Piwakawaka

Our day starts with a before school challenge which our parents or teachers help us with. When the bell goes we start with a song, dance and a karikia. The leader of the day calls the roll; we talk about being the best Highfield Learner we can be and then we are good to go.

The learning is centred around all the things we are interested in and we get to choose what we want to do. Sometimes we draw, write, paint, play in the home corner or fight dragons in the hedge area. We love the sand pit and mud kitchen where we play master chef prepare a wedding feast or build drains, dams, roads or help in the garden. Judy and Heather help us to learn all the skills we need to learn to read and write and we practice these things in fun ways like with playdough or shaving cream. Judy and Heather take turns to teach small groups guided reading, writing, maths, handwriting and letter knowledge. All the while we are being creative, solving problems, being imaginative and practising all the new things that Judy and Heather teach us. We love story telling, sometimes Judy helps us write our stories other times we act them out with puppets or toys.

We take turns to prepare for kai time, setting the table, cutting up fruit and vegetables to share. We wait until everyone is ready, the leader leads the karikia and then we eat. Judy and Heather sit and talk to us at kai time and we talk about the planet and how to look after it as well as sharing our thoughts and ideas about anything at all.

The afternoons are full of class games like rob the nest or team relays or obstacle courses. We love it when Judy takes an art lesson because she is an artist and teaches us to be artists as well. Sometimes we explore the school and playgrounds and get to have a turn on the new swings. We go to the library once a week and choose books to read at home. By the end of the day we are getting rather tired and enjoy stories or singing until it is time to go home.

We love having visitors so you are welcome to pop in and join in some learning with us anytime.
